What is Foodbank?

- Is the largest hunger relief organisation in Australia
- Is a national organisation, with distribution centres in five states and seven regional centres
- Is endorsed by the Australian Food and Grocery Council as the food industry's charity partner
- Is relied upon as the pantry of the welfare sector
- Distributes over 12 million kilos of donated food a year, which makes over 18 million meals
- Helps feed over 35,000 people everyday
- Has over 1,700 welfare agency members



How does Foodbank work? Foodbank acts as a conduit between the food and grocery industry's donations and the welfare sector's need. Food companies deliver their donations to Foodbank warehouse in NSW, VIC, QLD, SA and WA. Welfare agencies collect the donated food and distribute it to people who don't have enough to eat.

In partnership with the food industry, the corporate sector, governments, welfare agencies and volunteers, Foodbank is tackling the hidden problem of hunger in Australia, one empty stomach at a time.

The Food Industry is Foodbank's Major Partner Last year, 450 companies donated 12,000 tonnes of food and groceries to Foodbank. In recent years, increased donations have helped Foodbank make a real difference to Australia's hungry.

With the food industry's help Foodbank is targeting 20,000 tonnes of food by 2010.

Being a Foodbank Supporter is Simple As a non-profit organisation, Foodbank relies heavily on companies and individuals to donate goods, services and funding. Foodbank has over 35 National Donors and Supporters.

How to Get Involved If your company has food and groceries that are surplus to commercial demand, slow moving, short dated or unable to be sold, please consider donating them to Foodbank. If you're not part of the food industry, your company can donate goods, services volunteers or fund raising. If you're one person, you can donate individually.

Rotary News: Pakistan moves to end polio in the face of conflict

Pakistan's effort to eradicate polio is moving ahead, despite the displacement of up to one million people by the military conflict in the country's North-West Frontier Province.

Among the positive developments reported by the World Health Organization:

- As of 19 May, nine immunization teams had vaccinated almost 17,900 children under age five on the three main transit routes out of the conflict zone.

- More than 87,000 displaced people are living in 26 camps in the province. Mobile teams have gone tent to tent to immunize 6,890 children and are deployed at registration points to vaccinate newcomers.

- Almost 870,000 people -- about 90 percent of the total displaced population -- have registered as living with relatives or friends. Immunization teams are being trained to cover communities hosting displaced families to ensure that the children are vaccinated against polio and receive vitamin A supplements during National Immunization Days (NIDs) 28-30 May. Subnational Immunization Days are scheduled for 22-24 June.

WHO officials say it is vital to reach children of displaced families, because access to these children has been hampered by the poor security situation in the province.

To promote the upcoming NIDs, aimed at reaching 33 million children nationally, Rotarians and social workers joined a walk against polio in Karachi on 21 May, led by the city's deputy mayor, Nasreen Jalil.

"After the walk, the deputy mayor gave polio drops to kids and appealed to all citizens to participate," says Aziz Memon, a member of the Rotary Club of Karachi, Sind, and past governor of District 3270 (Afghanistan; Pakistan). "Because of the presence of the deputy mayor, the event was covered by all print and electronic media and will create a lot of awareness."
