The Ambassadorial Scholarships program furthers The Rotary Foundation's mission of improving health, supporting education, and alleviating poverty through three types of scholarships: Academic-Year for one academic year of study; Multi-Year for two consecutive years of study in a degree program; and Cultural for three or six months of intensive language study.



KENMORE ROTARY ENGAGEMENT IN RYDA

WHAT IS RYDA?

Kenmore Rotary has broken new ground by organizing the first Rotary Youth Driver Awareness (RYDA) program with secondary schools in the Western Suburbs of Brisbane

On Thursday 11 March, 120 Yr11 students from Kenmore State High School attended a day long seminar at the Sleeman Centre, Chandler. The program was run by Rotary to educate students on driving safely. It is aimed at reducing death and injury amongst young people on our roads. 16 to 24 year olds represent 15% of Australia's population but contribute to 30% of motor vehicle accidents.

The Program targets 16 and 17yr olds who are at the stage when they are starting to learn driving or ride in vehicles driven by their peers.

RYDA is a community based initiative of Rotary, partnering those organizations in our community that have a responsibility or interest in road safety for youth. It has been developed in conjunction with Police and relevant Government Departments and complements the schools' curriculum and government road safety messages.

There are 6 sessions in the program, covering Appreciation of Stopping Distances, Hazard Perception, Plan to Travel safely, Police Reports on Road Accidents, Survivors Personal Stories, and Costs of Car Ownership. Students came away with a much better understanding of the responsibilities of driving and the risks they face behind the wheel; How far it takes to stop a car at 40 to 80 k/h in dry or wet conditions, Plan B to get home after a night out, the devastating results from young paraplegics who made bad decisions, and my Life-my Choices for responsible travel on roads.

A vehicle was generously provided by Westpoint Holden at Indooroopilly for the demonstration of stopping distances during the program.

More than 750 university students from 60 countries were selected to study abroad as Rotary Ambassadorial Scholars during the 2009-10 academic year. Designed to bridge cultures and encourage goodwill, the program is one of Rotary's leading efforts to promote world peace and understanding.

Ambassadorial Scholarships provide undergraduate and graduate students the opportunity to study at participating universities in the 200 countries and geographical areas where Rotary clubs are active. While abroad, scholars participate in community service projects and speak at local Rotary club meetings and conferences, schools, civic organizations, and other forums where they serve as "goodwill ambassadors" for their home countries.

In 2008-09, nearly 700 scholars from some 70 countries studied in more than 60 nations, at a program cost of approximately US\$12 million.

Rotary's Ambassadorial Scholarships program is the world's largest privately sponsored international scholarship program. Focused on humanitarian service, personal diplomacy, and academic excellence, the program has sponsored more than 40,000 scholars since 1947.

WHAT IS THE PEACE FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM?

Amid daily headlines of war, suicide bombings, ethnic and religious violence, and social unrest The Rotary Foundation's Rotary World Peace Fellows to study peacemaking and conflict resolution at the six Rotary Centers for International Studies located at leading universities in England, Japan, Australia, Argentina, and the United States.

Launched in 2002, this innovative approach to world peace is a master's level program aimed at equipping the next generation of global and community leaders with skills needed to reduce the threat of war and violence. The Rotary World Peace Fellows are selected every year in a globally competitive process that begins when they apply through their local Rotary clubs. Applicants must demonstrate a commitment to peace and international understanding through their personal and community service activities or academic and professional achievements. Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Robert S. Scott notes that 225 Rotary Center alumni already are making a difference in key decision-making positions in governments and organizations around the world.

"It is this growing global network of participants, increasing by 60 every year, that makes us believe that peace *is* possible," Scott says. "It's not a dream -- it is reality."
